\$167,227 in Scholarships, Grants & Memorial Funds Awarded in 2011

he Board of Directors of the Pendleton Foundation Trust announced that grants, memorial trust funds and scholarships given in 2011 will total \$167,227.00.

The seven-member Board of Directors recently met to consider applications at its semi-annual meeting for the final allocation of grants this year, reported Kevin Hale, chairperson. The Pendleton Foundation Trust uses the earnings from money donated to the Trust by individuals, organizations and estates for its semi-annual grant allocations.

The board awarded fall grants in the amount of \$106,331.00 to the following recipients:

- St. Anthony Hospital Foundation, \$35,000.00 as the first installment of a \$100,000.00 match grant to be paid over a 5 year period toward the capital campaign for the new St. Anthony Hospital construction project.
- Blue Mountain Community College, \$9,325.00 to purchase a new curtain system for the Bob Clapp Theatre.
- River Quarter Committee, \$10,000.00 toward the purchase of the sculpture "Courting Blue Herons" by Michael Maiden, placed in the Riverfront Plaza.
- Oregon East Symphony & Chorale,
 \$3,000.00 to purchase small-sized violins, violas and cellos for the student strings program for fourth and fifth grade students.
- Umatilla County 4-H Program, \$2,800.00 toward the purchase of an educator mirroredpresentation table for hands-on teaching presentations at the Pendleton Extension Office.
- Eastern Oregon Alcoholism Foundation, \$8,800.00 to purchase a commercial stove for

David A. Horne Trust makes substantial gift to Foundation Trust

The Pendleton Foundation Trust has recently received a substantial gift from the David A. Horne Trust.

Mr. Horne lived his entire life in the Pendleton area. He was born in Pendleton on December 14, 1909 and graduated from Pendleton High School. In 1939 he married Eileen Elder who had two daughters. David raised the two girls as his own daughters, never treating them like "step" daughters. He was a wheat rancher until late in life when he leased out his farm and made a very tough transition to living in town. He had an extensive shop at the ranch and loved to restore old cars and equipment.

David was an avid pilot. He had a landing strip on the ranch where he kept his plane. David hosted many "Fly-Ins" at his ranch, for friends that flew. After harvest David and Eileen would travel around the Pacific Northwest and Canada in their plane. David took his first flying lesson in 1928. He received his license in 1943 and flew until he was in his late 70s. During World War II, he was an active member of the Oregon Civil Air Patrol and would fly the Oregon coastline in search of Japanese submarines.

David loved Eastern Oregon and Pendleton, as reflected in his trust. In addition to the Pendleton Foundation Trust



he made distributions to Pendleton Shrine Club, Olney Cemetery, Umatilla County Historical Society, Pendleton Ambulance Fund, Blue Mountain Community College and the Pendleton Library.

David had a quick smile and an endearing "chuckle." He love flying, farming, friends and a good cigar. His mind was sharp and his last goal was accomplished - he wanted to live to be 100 years old. He passed away six months after his 100th birthday.

Those of us that knew him miss him. Those that did not know him missed out on knowing a great guy.


