WHERE ARE THEY NOW? 2010 Fisk Recipient Deven Jennings

hen Deven Jennings won the Fisk Scholarship in 2010, he said, "I have always loved to help other people, especially in teaching them something new." Six years later, he is still pursuing that goal.

Following his graduation from Pendleton High School, Deven served a two-year mission for his church in Las Vegas, Nevada. While serving his mission, he decided that he loved serving and helping people. It was then that he decided he wanted to pursue an occupation in nursing.

He was accepted into the nursing program as one of 60 students whose average high school GPA was 3.9. In college, he served as vice president of the Student Nurses Association. He worked as a teaching assistant for four college courses and graduated in the top ten percent of his class. He was nominated by his classmates to be the graduating speaker at their college commencement.



Following graduation, Deven passed the NCLEX, the licensing examination for nurses, and was hired at the University Neuropsychiatric Institution at BYU in Salt Lake City, as a charge nurse on an acute psychi-

As Deven works as a psychiatric nurse, he has hopes of being accepted into the Doctorate in Nursing program at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City.

New Floors Make Big Impact for CMEO

2016 numbers skyrocketed at the Children's Museum of Eastern Oregon shortly after the installation of the "Roads to Discovery" exhibit. The exhibit included the replacement of the floors throughout the museum, featuring a roadway that winds throughout. Sections of the road display pipes that lie underneath a typical road in Pendleton. The exhibit was made possible largely through help of the Pendleton Foundation Trust.

Since the installation was completed in October of 2015, CMEO has seen a significant increase in visitors and program attendees to the tune of over 4,500 additional visitors than the previous year. "I credit much of the increase in visitors to the new floor" comments CMEO Executive Director, Heidi Anderson. "It not only provided a clean and inviting environment, but gave the whole museum a new look" she continued.

With more and more children and families utilizing the educational opportunities that CMEO provides, the museum is now looking for ways to partner with organizations and businesses in town to meet the growing need. "This project would not have happened without The Pendleton







Foundation Trust and we would have never reached those additional 4,500 children." Miss Anderson adds.

CMEO began in 1996 with a mission to provide children of all ages with opportunities for educational exploration and development through interactive exhibits and play. CMEO was created through the collaborative effort of over 300 community volunteers, and today has grown into an Eastern Oregon destination. In addition, CMEO is the ONLY children's museum in all of Eastern Oregon making it a unique community resource.

PFT Announces Fall Grants and Scholarships

he Board of Directors of the Pendleton Foundation Trust announced that grants, memorial trust funds and scholarships given in 2016 will total \$209.848.

The board has awarded fall grants in the amount of \$ 66,764.00 to the following recipients:

- Blue Mountain Community
 College, \$6,192.30 to purchase a John
 Deere Gator for use by the Athletics
 Department, as well as the Student
 Outreach and Leadership Department.
 The gator is needed to transport an
 injured athlete from the field, and for
 set up of the many sports and other
 activities on campus.
- Pendleton High School, Career Technical Education (CTE), \$20,235.00 to purchase a C02 laser cutter and associated peripherals for use in Engineering, Robotics, Business and Art programs at PHS.

- City of Pendleton, Parks
 Department, \$15,000.00 toward
 replacement of the playground
 equipment at Aldrich Park, May Park
 and Sherwood Park.
- Oregon East Symphony and Chorale, \$3,479.50 to purchase two half-size and three-quarter-size violins for the instrument lending library, and 20 battery powered stand lights with stand light charging station. The OES continues the Symphony Strings Program for 4th and 5th grade music students, and the music preparatory programs for 4th through 12th grade.
- Clearview Mediation and Disability Resource, \$2,126.00 to wrap the transport bus with current signage to identify their organization. The bus was donated to Clearview by an assisted living facility in Portland. Clearview uses the bus for delivery of gently-used durable medical

- equipment from their "medical loan closet" to anyone in our community at no cost.
- Pregnancy Care Services, \$7,480.00 to purchase and install new light fixtures, fresh paint, vinyl flooring, and some updated furniture pieces for the Pendleton office.
- Pendleton Public Library, \$4,737.34 to purchase shelving to expand the Teen Corner, comfortable teen friendly seating, a café table with charging station and two chairs for studying.
- Eastern Oregon Alcoholism
 Foundation, \$5,373.73 to purchase
 a new commercial dishwasher which
 will meet the sanitizing temperatures to
 meet Health Inspection requirements.
- Umatilla County Historical Society, \$2,140.00 toward the cost of energy lighting upgrades and a new outside awning at the new Thrift Store building.
