Jiggs and Maxine Fisk Memorial Scholarship

Bella Baumgartner was awarded the Jiggs and Maxine Fisk Memorial Scholarship of \$5,000. Bella will attend Oregon State University to study Political Science and Psychology in anticipation of application to law school.

Pendleton Foundation Trust Scholarships

Johann Valera-Vega was awarded one of two \$2,500 scholarships from the Pendleton Foundation Trust, to attend Barrett Honors College, Arizona State University, to study neuroscience in preparation for medical school.

Tyler is a graduating senior from Pendleton High School. He intends to use the \$2,500 scholarship to attend Oregon State University where he plans to major in teaching, with a minor in physics and chemistry. Tyler was

involved in numerous school and community activities, including serving as an FFA Chapter Officer and receiving his FFA State Degree. In addition, he participated in the PHS swim and cross-country teams. He is the son of Tim and Kathy Spratling.

This is the 42nd anniversary of the scholarship which honors the memory of David Jon Lindberg. The people of Pendleton established a perpetual memorial scholarship in his honor and is awarded to an outstanding Pendleton High School graduate whose career embodies the standards set by Lindberg: Commitment to citizenship, scholarship and family. am often asked why I live in Pendleton. I usually respond that I prefer "the small-town feel" or "the slower pace of life," but the question deserves a deeper, more thoughtful answer. For the most part, I am here because I was born and raised in Pendleton. According to the US Census Bureau, 72% of Americans live in or near the place where they grew up. Beyond the statistics, why do I choose to live in a small Oregon town, not lured away to the opportunities of the big city or the year-round warmth down south? If you Google the benefits of small-town living, you see reasons from brighter stars in the night sky to less traffic and fresh air. All these are good reasons, but I haven't hitched my wagon to Pendleton to see brighter stars. For me, it's a blue-jeans thing. You know, when you find that pair of pants that really fit you, you just want to wear them every day. Even though you can buy another pair the same size, it's just not the same feel. With Pendleton, it's about our unique identity.

We have a strong sense of community and history here in Pendleton. The story of the "Old West" is kept alive by our Pendleton Underground Tours, Umatilla Historical Society, and the Tamástslikt Cultural Institute; they remind us of where our town came from. The Pendleton Center for the Arts and Crow's Shadow enrich our lives with world-class art

and the Oregon East Symphony fills our ears and hearts with beautiful music several times a year. New events are being added every year including the Cattle Barons Weekend, Pendleton Whisky Music Fest, the Old Iron Show and Oktoberfest Pendleton. And, of course, you can't hear the name "Pendleton" without thinking of the Round-Up and the Woolen Mills.

Even beyond these cultural attractions, we have a different approach to living here. The bonds between neighbors here are stronger and the sense of belonging is more profound than you might find in the big city. In Pendleton, people make the difference and volunteerism is at the heart of being a Pendletonian. If you are not finding Pendleton as enjoyable as you would like, get involved in our community. I urge you to volunteer your time and your talents and you can also volunteer by donating. Help out and contribute to your favorite non-profit organization or simply volunteer to help your neighbor. Pendleton has a plethora of causes and organizations to support. I guarantee that you will benefit just as much as those you serve and our community will be better for it.

Foundation Trust Grant Process

ver wondered how you could help your fellow citizens of Pendleton and turn your worthwhile project into an asset that the community will use for many years to come? We are here to help. The Pendleton Foundation Trust receives gifts of money and property from interested persons and organizations, and in turn, invests this money and property for the benefit of citizens of Pendleton. How exactly is this done?

The Foundation Board of Directors consists of seven local citizens and operates as the governing body of the Pendleton Foundation Trust. The board solicits ideas and requests from the community at large in order to decide how to disburse to worthy organizations or agencies for worthwhile projects, the distributable income that has accrued from the trust funds the previous year. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year, and the Foundation Trust Board meets to discuss funding of grant requests that have been received twice each year, in April and in October.

When you submit a grant application, what's next? Typically, ahead of one of the two funding board meetings, the grant requests are distributed among the seven board members in order to research the projects and organizations that are requesting funding. The Foundation's mission is to grant monies to those organizations that will promote civic, educational, or charitable uses as will most effectively assist, encourage and promote the well-being of the citizens and inhabitants of the City of Pendleton. To further

this mission, Foundation Trust Board members will review each application and in turn, contact the group or organization that is requesting funds and conduct an interview and in many cases a tour of a proposed project. During the interview, and according to the Pendleton Foundation guidelines, special emphasis will be placed on projects that utilize materials purchased from local businesses, use of the completed project by the largest number of Pendleton residents possible, and durability of the project...how long will citizens of Pendleton be utilizing your project?

Following this review by an individual board member, the entire board meets at one of the funding sessions to discuss each and every grant request as a group, keeping in mind the overall qualifications and the emphasis on local impact from spending locally to utilization. If your application and interview are successful, your project can be funded! It's that simple.

The Pendleton Foundation Trust looks forward to your group bringing in a grant application in order to fund a worthwhile project. And, as you read this, we encourage you to spread the word about the Pendleton Foundation Trust to your friends and invite them to submit an application to make the City of Pendleton a better place to live.

PFT Announces Spring Grants

he Board of Directors of the Pendleton Foundation Trust have announced allocations totaling \$73,712.25 to nine community organizations and seven memorial trust funds.

Recipients of Current Spring Grants

- Oregon Trail Manor, Inc. -\$5,000.00 to purchase and install 4 walk-in showers for the elderly at Oregon Trail Manor in Pendleton.
